Weekly News Summary for Sunday, September 14, 2025.

Hatteras Island experienced rough surf and minor ocean overwash early this past week. Until Friday, the island stayed sandwiched between fronts bringing gray weather, cooler temperatures and north northeast winds.

Rip currents and strong longshore currents brought serious warnings from the National Weather Service.

Rain chances pick up in the coming week. A coastal low pressure system is likely to hang off the North Carolina coast. National Weather Service forecasters say "we will need to watch how this evolves but safe to say rain chances increasing quite a bit for midweek."

Speed limit changes made Monday

N.C. Department of Transportation crews will reinstall off-season speed limit signs along sections of N.C. 12 in several parts of Currituck and Dare counties on Sept. 15, weather permitting.

On Monday, speed limits in areas through Rodanthe, Waves and Salvo, as well as in Corolla and Frisco, will return to 45 miles per hour from their seasonal speed limits of 35. Off-season speed limits also will resume in the Cape Hatteras National Seashore, such as the area near the Haulover Parking Lot south of Avon. The media release from the Department of Transportation did not list Avon village as returning to 45 miles per hour. Avon has been included in years past. Motorists are advised to continue driving with caution, as there are still many motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians on the Outer Banks in the fall.

Seasonal speed limits will return on May 15, 2026.

No electronic devices in District Court

Going to District Court? Leave electronic devices behind.

Published on Friday, September 12, and effective immediately, electronic devices shall not be allowed inside District Court Courtrooms in the First Judicial District.

Any person before entering any courtroom in the First Judicial District in which District Court is or is to be in session, shall be subject to search of his or her person.

If any such electronic device is found, the same shall be subject to immediate seizure by the Sheriff and held until further order of the court.

If any person does enter any courtroom with such device without prior permission, he or she shall be subject to the contempt powers of this court.

Specifically exempted from this order banning devices are law enforcement officers, officers of the court and attorneys at law licensed to practice before this court.

Candidate party affiliation must be registered by September 19

North Carolina law requires candidates that intend to seek a party nomination in the 2026 elections to be affiliated with a recognized political party for at least 90 days before filing.

That means those who intend to file for the March 2026 primary must have their party affiliation registered with their county Board of Elections no later than Friday, September 19, 2025, writes Sam Walker on the Island Free Press

Candidate filing for the 2026 election is scheduled for December 1-19, 2025.

Recognized political parties in North Carolina are Democrat, Green, Libertarian and Republican. Those who are registered as unaffiliated are not eligible to file in races that have a party primary, and must instead use the petition process to qualify to be listed on the general election ballot or as a write-in candidate.
